Anne Jamieson was commended for her decade of passionate service to Youth Connect, after formally stepping down from her role as Chairperson. The Chief Executive Officer, Danny Schwarz led attendees down memory lane, and concluded with a photomontage of the last 20 years until now.

Youth Connect is a leading non-profit, community focused organisation that has provided assistance to youth for two decades. The organisation aims to provide youth with pathway choices through secondary education, further learning and employment to reach their goals. Youth Connect provide

over 20 services due to the strong, working relationships it has with other organisations and agencies within the South Eastern, Inner Eastern and Northern Melbourne regions.

Youth Connect are fortunate enough to have exhibited and presented at different expos/conferences last term.

The Street Beat Festival run by Victoria Police was held on Valentine's Day, Tuesday, 14 February. The emphasis of the event was to improve perceptions of safety, encouraging young people to report crime and encouraging sports and community activities as alternatives to crime and anti social behaviour. There were a manner of services and activities, including the Police Rock Band 'Code One', face painting and hair styling, The Ambulance Service and a multitude of youth services.



Youth Connect presented to students at the RMIT City Campus at the Youth Service and Alcohol and other Drugs expo. The aim of exposing them to a range of services available to young people in the community and some of the agencies who deliver that work. Parents As Transition Career Support



(PACTS) **FREE** information sessions are developed to provide parents with up-to-date information and resources about educational pathways, that enables them to support their children effectively when making career transition decisions within the secondary school system and beyond. PACTS sessions cover job search websites and job search techniques, assisting with resume writing and cover letters, assisting with interview preparation, finding work experience; learning about pathway/education/training including VCE, VCAL, VET programs and apprenticeships. Over the last 12 months we have developed the range of PACTS workshops as well as our role, endorsed by the Brotherhood of St Laurence, in delivering PACTS Facilitator Training in Victoria and interstate. This development has been in response to requests from a wide range of school, community and service delivery representatives and organisations. The areas PACTS now covers includes, disability, CALD, Community, Aboriginal, Community Services Workers, Primary schools as well as being translated into nearly ten languages.

Recently Daniela and Danny travelled to Ipswich in Queensland to present at forum arranged by the regional Partnership Brokers Worklinks. The forum provided participants with an overview of PACTS including how participating in PACTS Facilitator Training would enable them to engage with Parents to better support young people with their Career and Transition options and opportunities. Participants attending included representatives from The Department of Education Queensland, Regional Indigenous Partnership Officers, Independent School Association, School to Work Indigenous Support Unit, regional National Disability Coordinator, Youth Connections Providers, Schools, Community organisations and services providers including Mission Australia and the Smith Family and TAFE Vet Coordinators.

They also ran a forum in regional Queensland in West Morten – Laidley and an information session with Woodridge State High School and Griffith University which included a demonstration Express PACTS workshop.

As a result of these meetings we will be running a number of Facilitator Trainings in Queensland over the coming months as well as already being asked to present for other regional Partnership Brokers.

Keeping on the interstate theme we will be delivering PACTS Facilitator Training in Goulburn NSW in May as well.

In Victoria we have continued to work with a range of organisations including the South East LLEN with whom we supported an application for funding that was successful for the delivery of Career As Transition Support (CATS) for Multicultural Education Aides, Ethnic community Leaders, youth workers and community agencies that support young disadvantaged young people. In addition to this we have been working closely with our Regional Koori Transition Officer and will be running a pilot Aboriginal PACTS to the Regional Koori Education Support Officers.

Lastly as part of our partnership with the Brotherhood of St Laurence we will be working with them over the next six months to conduct an evaluation of PACTS. As well as looking at the effectiveness of the program the evaluation will look at the impact of the program on the support and decision making of young people as a result of their parents, careers or teachers participating in PACTS. The Evaluation is due to be completed by October.

The How I See It Youth Photography Competition ran again this year. The project is about celebrating and recognising young people's significance and achievements in the City of Kingston. We invited young people aged 12-25 for the opportunity to showcase their creative talents through photography. In conjunction with National Youth Week, projects such as this give young people a sense of connection with their local community and make them aware of positive activities and past-times they can undertake with their peers.

The aim of this project is to inspire the entrants to explore their creativity and to re-examine their views of themselves, the community and their world. We also hope that the entrants have been inspired to view the world through a camera lens and to reflect on what it is they see or *how they see 'it'*.

The Competition drew to a close with an exhibition night on Thursday, 19 April, with all photos displayed. Over 20 participants entered photos taken of buildings, beaches, parks, flora and other creative works of art. This was a great opportunity for the youth of Kingston to show their talent through photography. The exhibition night held at the Youth Connect Office, saw all photos displayed and over 50 attendees. 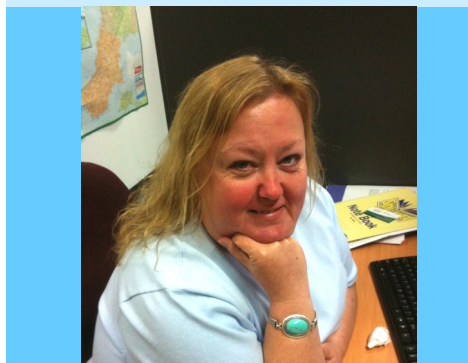
